**Training?** What training? Policy requires 12 hours of annual foster care training before your reassessment is considered complete. Don't wait until the last minute to fill those credit hours! We are excited to announce we will be starting inperson trainings soon. Our first one is May 15<sup>th</sup>. More trainings will be coming!

the future of our Tribal Nation rests with our children. We must invest in their futures, instill in them the values of family, faith, and culture, and ensure they have every opportunity to realize their full potential. The development of our children begins at home, and my Administration is fully committed to strengthening Tribal families.

this month, we recognize that there are children in our towns and communities who may not have a family, or whose families may be experiencing great difficulty and hardship. We believe in standing beside these children, walking with them through their trials, and finding temporary safe families for each of them. Kindhearted Tribal Members embody this belief, dedicating their time and efforts in doing so. Currently there are 104 Tribal families across the state of Oklahoma who have opened their homes to 2,926 tribal children in custody. Of those 104 homes we are extremely grateful for our 54 Choctaw Nation licensed homes. During National Foster Care Month, we honor these Champions for Children, who opened their hearts to children who need a home, and who care for the most vulnerable among us. We also acknowledge the profound contributions of the individuals and organizations supporting foster and kinship caregivers, and those of the community providers and professionals who are helping children in in foster care find safe and stable families.

children deserve stable family environments, and foster care provides a wonderful opportunity for selfless and compassionate men and women to nurture children while we work to help their family to ensure they can safely return home or find their forever home. This month, and always, we express our gratitude to all the Tribal families who generously open their doors to our Tribal children in need and provide them with love and support. We recommit to support our children by helping provide increased opportunities to recruit more Native Champions of Children to invest in the lives of our vulnerable young people, and we celebrate those who tirelessly serve our Tribal children in foster care.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Gary Batton, Chief of the Choctaw Nation, acting under the power vested in me under the Constitution of the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma do hereby proclaim May 2021 as

I call upon all Tribal Members to observe this month by taking time to help children and youth in foster care and to recognize the commitment of those who touch their lives, particularly celebrating their foster parents and other caregivers.

# No Takebacks

Recently, I packed an item to send back to Amazon. It's so easy to just tape up a box, stick a label on it, and send it packing. How many times have we

wanted to do that with other things in our lives? Food order wrong? Send it back. Clothes don't work for the kiddos? Return it. Foster kid not working out with your family? Send them back.

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Wait! What? No, of course you can't just send a child back. There is a lot of thought that goes into accepting a placement and more in asking for a child to be moved. Sometimes a child is not a perfect fit for your family. This is why it is important to be honest with yourself when filling out the Child's Needs List every time. Are you willing to take a child with a terminal illness? No - then mark it.

So often people feel judged for their feelings. This is one area where you should not shy away from letting your specialist know how you feel. First placement should be the best placement for a child in outof-home care. The more moves a child experiences; the more chances they have of experiencing additional trauma.

There's a reason we've adopted "Pray About It" for our flyers. Pray for your children. Pray for those in foster care. Pray for child welfare. Pray to be led in the right direction when selecting behaviors and conditions you are willing to accept in a child.

The note on the left was written by an Oklahoma child in foster care. This is all they wanted in a family. As a Choctaw Nation Resource Home, you have the ability to provide so much more than the necessities. You are able to provide the love and comfort a child needs.



# Shout out to Adoptions!

The goal of children in out-of-home care is reunification. Unfortunately, reunification does not always occur. Choctaw Nation does not open adoption only homes. However, we do have a dedicated adoption team lead by manager, Kimberly Baca. Her unit focuses on helping legally free children find permanency. Kimberly, Cynthia, Talynn, and Twila work tirelessly to help Choctaw children find their permanent home. They work with OKDHS as well. Although we do not open adoption only homes, our resource homes are eligible to adopt should a child become legally free with no appropriate relative. Kimberly and her team work hard to find family members. The goal of out-of-home care is reunification – sometimes it just isn't with the child's parents. Yakoke to our adoptions team who work hard to find forever homes for Choctaw youth.
